The Empty Crib-Formation Director-Donna Kendall

One of the initial undertakings that first-time parents embark upon is shopping for a baby crib. Once they get the + mark on the pregnancy test or visit a doctor and get an ultrasound confirmation, the job at hand is to seek out the perfect crib for their first child. It's exciting and much thought for safety, style, and sturdiness goes into the decision. They search various baby stores and/or furniture stores or nowadays probably go online and do their research for the best-rated crib. Naturally, they want the best that they can afford for their new child. Currently, new cribs range from \$200-\$1600. Those in more meager circumstances may rely on charity, second-hand cribs, or a makeshift cradle.

While listening to the Christmas hymn "Away in a Manger" this past month, the lyrics that say, "Away in a manger, no crib for a bed, the little Lord Jesus lay down his sweet head" really struck me. I imagined that Mary and Joseph, like most parents, thought about a crib for their new baby – not just any baby – but the Son of the Most High. I suspect that Joseph, being a skilled carpenter probably got right to work. He would have made a special crib for Jesus, but as we know, he and Mary had to leave Nazareth for Bethlehem, and then flea to Egypt, leaving an empty crib behind. What really struck me about the hymn's lyrics was the image of any modern day parent placing their newborn in an animal trough instead of a Wayfair baby crib. We hear these lyrics every year and hopefully do not become desensitized to the image of the most precious baby ever born lying in a stable feeding box. That image should remain with us throughout the year because there are children born in poverty whose parents cannot afford a luxury crib or even have access to a second-hand cradle. There is a reason Jesus chose these humble beginnings. Who would have given a second thought to our Savior being placed in a crib provided by loving parents? That's the norm.

In a children's book about Saint Francis of Assisi written by Father Lawrence G. Lovasik, S.V.D. the story begins with the mother of Francis, Pica Bernadone, wanting "to be like the Mother of God. She wanted her son to be born in a stable... She left her beautiful bedroom to go to one of the stalls in her stable before her baby was born. The first cradle of Francis was one of straw in a stable – like Jesus." Eleven hundred years after the birth of Jesus, the pursuit of imitating his humble birth and recalling the plight of the poor was foremost on Francis' mother's mind, and later Francis himself. As followers of Francis, keeping Christ's humility should be foremost on our minds as well.

When Jesus endured his passion and death, he also left behind an empty tomb. Salvation history begins with humility and ends in glory. Let us make the upcoming New Year the year we pursue humility and live our lives giving glory to God. In January we will begin with what we can leave behind this year.






