Dear Brothers and Sisters,

November is a very auspicious month for the members of our order. For one thing on November 17 we celebrate the feast of the patron of our order St. Elizabeth of Hungary. Though a member of royalty Elizabeth was a Franciscan and lived the Franciscan way. The patron of both us Seculars and the religious of the Third Order, after the death of her husband at the tender age of 20 she put away her royal lifestyle and used her dowry to build a hospital where she served the sick and dying. Remember that Elizabeth's feast is a solemnity for our order and we start her celebration on the vigil with evening prayers.

On the November 24th we follow the cycle of the wider liturgical year and

pray for all the deceased of the Seraphic Order, honoring our deceased brothers and sisters who have gone to their reward in Christ. On November 29 we honor all of the Saints of the Seraphic Order, especially those who have no feast day of their own. In this we reverse the order of the greater Church who honor first all Saints on November 1st, a holy day of obligation, followed by All Souls Day on November 2nd. It is fitting that we think of the dead in this month that wraps up the liturgical year, when the readings turn to contemplation of the Last Things, death, judgment, Heaven and Hell. The Saints have faced judgment and achieved the glory of Heaven. We hope all souls, and especially those souls of the members of our own Seraphic Orders, will be found worthy at the Last Judgment and join them in Heaven.

the holy one answered.


"They come for refief and COMFORT.

The Pork Chop Dilemma by Thomas Merton

One time when I was nine years old, I was spending the weekend with my buddy David. We came to the supper table with ravenous appetites. And Miss Ad (as I called her) was serving up some fantastic breaded pork chops. She placed two beauties on my plate, added some scalloped potatoes, when she stopped sudenly and said, "Oh Jimmy, I forgot. Your Catholic. You can't eat meat on Fridays." Then I remembered too.

Now the readers who have been around a while know what abstinence meant for catholics in the 1940's. Meat on Fridays was Strictly forbidden, a prohibition was concidered very serious by every Catholic. There was no way I was going to touch those pork chops, no matter how good they smelled! But Miss Ad suggested that she call mom. She came back from the next room and said, "Jimmy your mom wants to talk to you." I went to the phone and said, "Hi Mom." My mom, the theologian, responded with just two words very emphatically. "You're dispensed!" Holy smokes, I thhought. I dispensed!. You can't be more dipensed than when your mother dispenses, because next to God she has more power than the Pope.

Who needs a priest when your mom issues a dispensation? I have no doubht that God in heaven ratified her dispensation and warned that no one should counterdict her. Those pork chops? Indeed they were dellicious.
