Message from our Minister ...

October was a great month for me and for others for venerating Franciscan relics. It started on the evening of October 3rd, the Transitus of St. Francis. Susan James, Ken Holt and I made a pilgrimage to the Bethlehem Monastery of the Poor Clares in Barhamsville for the Transitus service with the Poor Clare sisters. It was a beautiful service starting with a reading about the life of St. Francis by C.S. Lewis. The remainder of the service was sung in Latin. (We did have copies of the service so we could follow along and sing if so inclined.) After the service we were able to individually venerate a relic of St. Francis. The evening ended with singing Compline. It was a beautiful and solemn evening. Here is a picture of Ken venerating the relic of St. Francis.



The second opportunity to venerate Franciscan relics came later in the month when St. Bede hosted a



viewing and veneration of 1st and 2nd class relics of St. Pio of Pietrelcina, better known as Padre Pio, a priest of the First Order. This was the only opportunity in Virginia to see the relics. The daily Mass celebrated prior to opening the relics to veneration had over 500 people in attendance.

The veneration was all day and over 2.000 people passed by the five relics to venerate and touch rosaries and prayer cards to the relics. It was a beautiful and holy experience for all who attended. Here is a picture of

A Reflection About Bread From Our Formation Director-Donna Kendall

Now that we are well into the season of Autumn and the chillier weather awakens our senses: the sight of colorful foliage, the briskness of cooler temperatures, the scent emitted by a wood-burning fireplace, the sound of rustling leaves – one of the most fulfilling gifts we can enjoy is homemade bread. The aroma filling the home, the taste of a warm slice with melted butter or olive oil fills the soul with an indescribable satisfaction.

Personally, I don't do as much baking in the summer because of the heat and I gravitate towards cold foods like salads and sandwiches, but once autumn hits, the slow cooker steams with soups and there is usually bread baking in the oven. As November approaches I like to think of Saint Elizabeth of Hungary, whose feast day we celebrate on November 17. She is most often pictured with a basket of bread that she shared with the poor.

Bread is an amazing thing if you really stop to think about it. The ingredients are very simple: flour, yeast, salt, water, and a bit of oil. But what makes it amazing is the *process of making bread*. A delicious loaf of bread cannot be rushed. It takes time. The yeast has to do its thing when mixed with water. The dough must be kneaded properly. Then, the dough must rise. Finally, the bread must be baked at the correct temperature. My mother taught me to use a knife and draw a cross into the dough to bless it before I cover it and put it into the oven to prove.

If you think about it, each human being is a bit like a loaf of bread. (I'm not making this up; there are blogs written about this!) "The Holy Spirit is like the yeast; He is a gift given to us by God to work in us in order to make sure we rise. His work in me takes time. Proving of my character, so to speak, is never a quick process, just like proving my bread dough." (Sherry Fam) Certainly, this process does not happen quickly. It happens in God's time.

Aren't we fortunate, as Catholics, to have the bread of life that aids in our process of sanctification? Francis' devotion to the Eucharist presents us with a beautiful example of the transformative process of receiving Christ's body and blood. When Francis approached the Blessed Sacrament and received the Body and Blood of Christ, he did so like a child in complete awe of his loving Creator. "For Francis, Communion was the grand exchange it should be, wherein he received the Gift unspeakable, and in return gave himself to be lifted up and transfigured and made a partaker in the intimate life of God Himself." (Father Albert J. Nimeth, O.F.M)
