

2021 Quinquennial

The National Fraternity Council came together by Zoom Teleconference, to discuss the upcoming 2021 Quinquennial (The Q) to be held in Phoenix, Arizona. The council weighed the pro's and con's concerning the COVID-19 pandemic that continues to

keep us somewhat restricted in many States. It was the decision of the National Council to cancel the Quinquennial (The Q) in 2021.

This decision was made due to the uncertainty associated with the Pandemic. The council has set their sights to hold the Quinquennial, possibly in 2023. The new dates have not been set yet. The NEC has begun renegotiating the contract. Details will be relayed as soon as decisions are made. Stay tuned.
